"A great place to live, work and play"

lackamas County is as diverse as the state of Oregon as a whole.
With thousands of farms, dozens of which are certified organic, Clackamas County also has more nurseries and more Christmas tree farms than any other county in Oregon. Clackamas County's natural beauty borders Portland to the north, and its western areas largely feature urban amenities.

In between is the Highway 212 industrial district, the growing communities along Interstate 205, Clackamas Town Center and Oregon's original capital, Oregon City. Despite the recent economic downturn, the county continues to grow, adding more than 12,000 residents over the past three years.

Tourism opportunities abound, with the rugged and beautiful Mt. Hood National Forest and a number of state and county parks offering plentiful hiking, biking, skiing and camping opportunities throughout the area. Clackamas County was one of four original districts created by a Provisional Legislature in 1843. At that time it covered portions of four present-day states and one Canadian province. In 1844 the Columbia River was made the northern boundary of the county, and the United States-Great Britain Boundary Treaty of 1846 relocated the northern border of both the United States and Clackamas County at latitude 49 degrees. In 1854, Clackamas County acquired the boundaries it has today.

Long before the arrival of the settlers, the land now known as Clackamas County — named after the Clackamas Indians — was an important crossroads for Native Americans. They came to hunt, fish and gather at Oregon City's Willamette Falls.

Chairman John Ludlow

Ludlow previously served as mayor of Wilsonville, on the Wilsonville City Council and as a board member for Clackamas Community College. He has twice been honored as Wilsonville Citizen of the Year and received the Oregon Department of Corrections 2012 Outstanding Volunteer Award

Jim Bernard

B rnard was elected in November 2008. He previously served as mayor of Milwaukie for eight years and is the owner of a third-generation, family-owned business founded in 195 — B rnard's Garage. Currently a Wilsonville resident, B rnard was born and raised in Milwaukie, and was instrumental in starting the city's farmers market.



Paul Savas

Savas is serving his first term on the board, winning election in 2010. Savas owns an automotive tuning and repair shop that he opened on McLoughlin Boulevard 25 years ago. He has also served on the Oak Lodge Sanitary District Board, the Oak Lodge Water District Board and other boards. He lives in Oak Grove with his wife and two children. He is the only commissioner who lives in the North Clackamas urban areas.



Martha Schrader

Schrader previously served as a county commissioner from 2003 to 2009 and she also served as a state senator from 2009 to 2011. She holds a bachelor's degree from Cornell University, a master's degree from the University of Illinois, and has completed advanced coursework in public policy and administration at Portland State University.



Tootie Smith

Smith was a state representative from 2001 to 2005 where she served on several key committees including Ways and Means. A fourth-generation farmer, a former journalist and lobbyist, she has served as a chief financial officer for several corporations. She served on the board of directors for the B ain Injury Association of Oregon for seven years and was its president for two years.

Clackamas Cont y Mat 's new:

Is the Clackamas County ${\bf B}\,$ ard of Commissioners on the brink of another major political shakeup?


Chairman o hn Ludlow and Commissioner Tootie Shi th, who just unseated a couple of board members in November 2012, now believe iJ m B rnard and Paul Savas are two other commissioners who should be replaced. In endorsing these incumbent's challengers, Ludlow spent most of an 80- word letter criticizing Savas and B rnard.

The shakeup began at the onset of 2011, when former Chairwoman Lynn Peterson announced she would leave to serve as a policy advisor to Gov. John Kitzhaber. Charlotte Lehan was appointed to replace Peterson, and commissioners filled Lehan's vacancy with a mie a mon, but a ith and Ludlow unseated them on a platform of battling P ortland creep."

Countywide votes against the new light-rail line resulted in a successful lawsuit by TriMet to prevent any delay of the project to connect Milwaukie and Oak Grove with Portland. In addition, the county and the Oregon Department of Transportation are constructing the 8nri se project to create a new, limited access highway between I-205 and the Rock Creek Junction along Highways 212224. They hope the connection will ease congestion and help with freight traffic.



he city of Damascus is in northeastern Clackamas County, distinguished by dramatic forested buttes, rolling hills and valleys crossed with streams, all under the watchful eye of majestic Mount Hood and less than 15 miles from downtown Portland.

A half dozen families had established the early beginnings of the Damascus community by 1852 as they laid claims along the B rlow-Foster Trail, a spur off the old B rlow Road, which connected E gle Creek and Portland — a historic settlers route that would later become Sunnyside Road.

The name Damascus as an identifier for the community can be traced back to 18 When a post office by that name was established.

Despite the proximity to metropolitan Portland, and although local residents had long enjoyed amenities (like water service to their homes) not common in other unincorporated rural

The city of Damascus boundaries are roughly the Multnomah County line to the north and Southeast 257th Avenue to the east. The southern boundary is as far south as the Clackamas River in some places, and to the west the boundary is SE 177th Avenue

Voters in 2004 also chose members of the first Damascus City Council, many of whom had been involved with the citizen group advocating the formation of the new city. Presently, they are working with the Damascus community, Clackamas County and the state to preserve the spirit of Damascus for future generations.

Although a majority of residents who cast ballots in November 2013 voted to disincorporate, a "double-majority" of all 6,879 registered voters was required but not reached, so the measure failed. Sanctions from the state against Damascus for not filing a comprehensive growth plan include the recent passage of House B II 4029 which gives some Damascus residents the right to withdraw, or de-annex, from Damascus and join with another nearby municipality.

Previous attempts to have an approved plan have failed, and now three comprehensive plans will be on the May ballot. One of the plans, the original plan developed by staff and the Damascus Planning Commission, will be on the ballot because of a petition signature campaign. A second plan, said to favor private property, was prepared under the guidance of Mayor Steve Spinnett. The third plan, sponsored by City Council President Andrew Jackman, is said to have an environmental bent that protects the city's rural character.



Wade De rs, the mayor of Gladstone who's planning to file for a record eighth re-election campaign, has lived in the community most of his life.

His favorite thing about Gladstone? T he people who choose to live there," he said.

After the Trolley Trail, a 6 mile paved path to link existing bike lanes, came to fruition between Gladstone and Milwaukie, Union Pacific removed an old Clackamas River trolley bridge that had been eyed for pedestrians. Now city leaders will explore other options for linking Oregon City to a continuous 20-mile network connecting Portland, Milwaukie, Gladstone and Gresham.

Gladstone city councilors had hoped to build a new library to consolidate the current Gladstone Library and the Oak Grove Library into one new facility. Bit after voters rejected a plan that would have authorized the library's urban-renewal funding, leaders considering other proposals to consolidate the libraries or renovate both structures.

OAK GROVE

Over a century of history.

or the inside word on the history of Oak Grove, talk to longtime resident Dick Jones. Jones described the boundaries of Oak Grove this way: "To the west, is the Willamette River, north is the city of Milwaukie, south is the Oregon City School District boundary and east is Kellogg Creek."

To distinguish between Oak Grove and Oak Lodge, Jones noted that to him, Oak Grove is where the old town of Oak Grove is situated. "It's a little sliver along Oak Grove Boulevard; from Oatfield Road to the river," he added.

Oak Lodge, Jones said, is a bigger area, a "more all-encompassing area."

His parents moved to Oak Grove when he was only 4 years old, because they wanted to "get out of the big city," he said.

His parents could "move around via the railroad" that ran through downtown Oak Grove.

"Its quite different now." Jones

noted, in that people use the rail system to get to populated areas.

"In those days people used the railroad to get out to less dense areas — it's an interesting twist," he said.

Jones noted that he "rode the streetcar until its last day," in 1958, and said he remembers when the only grocery store was the Piggly-Wiggly, on Courtney and McLoughlin.

Jones left Oak Grove for a period of time after college, but in 1994, he moved back into the same house where he grew up.

Oak Grove is special to him, because it is "one of those low-density areas where people know people. You can still walk on the streets safely," he noted.

Jones is particularly fond of the Trolley Trail, which passes by right outside his house. Clackamas County completed an extension of the trail last year

JOHNSON CITY

Established in 1970

ne of the smallest cities in the metropolitan area with just over 630 people — though not the smallest in the state — Johnson City may be easy for Clackamas residents to overlook, but it's beloved by the people who live there.

Johnson City, near Gladstone, was incorporated by a 49-to-10 vote on June 16, 1970. At the time of the election, it had the distinction of being owned entirely by one man, Delbert Johnson. Johnson started the development as a trailer court in 1959 and tried without success to have the 45-acre area annexed to Gladstone in 1968. The 1969 Oregon legislature established a boundary review board to prevent a proliferation of small incorporated cities, but the propo-

nents had filed for an election before the effective date of the law.

Last May, residents of Johnson City voted to become part of the Clackamas River Water District, where the citizens had gotten their water for many years. City councilors encouraged approval of the measure to ensure continued water supply from CRW, and to allow citizens to vote in CRW elections.



Happy Valley Mayor Lori DeRemer, who is in her fourth year as mayor, plans to seek another term. With a newly reached agreement over an eventual border between Milwaukie and Happy Valley, DeRemer also said Happy Valley will continue to welcome annexation requests. Happy Valley's goal is to annex to the Clackamas River, and Milwaukie will be ä ggressively annexing" as well, although Milwaukie's potential reach is much more landlocked by other cities than Happy Valley's. Areas in Damascus bordering Happy Valley may soon be able to switch allegiances thanks to a recent vote by the Oregon Legislature. Dual jurisdictions between Clackamas County and Happy Valley are also a challenge in successfully developing the proposed & gle Landing project.

Last fall, Metro favored Happy Valley's bike-lane and sidewalk project on Southeast 129 h Avenue with a \$. Z million grant to provide safe connectivity for pedestrians and bicyclists between Mountain Gate Road and Scott Creek Lane. Happy Valley also received \$3 100 for it's Rock Creek Inp loyment Center Infrastructure Funding Plan to encourage "development ready" sites in what's identified as a Regionally Significant Industrial/ Enp loyment Area with approximately 200 buildable acres.

What's new:

Milwaukie voters face a major decision on the May ballot on whether to accept an extra \$ 6 tax on the average property to pay off TriMet for the city's debt for light rail set to open in September 2015.

If voters don't pass the \$\\$\ \text{million bond measure, Milwaukie would} \text{have to cut an estimated two or three staff members next year. City Manger B II Monahan proposed a budget April 24, and additional meetings are scheduled for additional review and discussion of the budget on May 29 and Une 5 at 6 p.m. at City Hall.

City councilors believe it's important that citizens be able to choose the level of services to be provided within the community. Milwaukies 18 budgeted employees this past year almost put it below West Linn's employee number. In the past three years, 44 employees have left or were fired from Milwaukie, and the city has decided not to refill many of these positions.

Currently the city pays a 5 percent interest rate to TriMet, but the rates have been hovering above 4 percent based on the city's credit rate. Milwaukie Finance Director Casey Camors warned City Council that the rates could go up when and if the city issues bonds in a few months.

Councilors also referred a measure to voters to change the city charter for the city manager's residency requirement. Managers haven't lived in the city for decades, and Milwaukie elected officials have used their power designated by the charter to excuse Bill Monahan from moving within six months of his hire. The measure would make clear that Milwaukie's top administrator would never be required to live within city limits.



OREGON CITY

End of the Oregon Trail

here's a good reason Oregon City hosts the annual First City Celebration. Founded in 189 and incorporated in 184, Oregon City is a city of impressive firsts.

It's the first incorporated city west of the Rocky Mountains. It's the site of the first municipal elections, newspaper and Protestant church. B t the city owes its existence not to any of those manmade firsts, but to something that was here long before the first settlers arrived: Willamette Falls.

T he city of Oregon City is based on the location of the falls," said local historian Patrick Harris. Wi llamette Falls makes it a very good place to develop industry."

According to Harris, in 189 Dr. John McLoughlin built a sawmill there — but the falls had already been important to Native Americans as a place for fishing, hunting and celebration for thousands of years. "Many of the observers noted it was a place of great potential development," Harris said.

McLoughlin later settled in the little city at the falls, earning him the title of f ather of Oregon City," as well as being the father of Oregon itself.

Oregon City, by the late 19th century, was also a famous "last" — last stop on the Oregon Trail.

The small city boomed; the first steamboats on the Willamette River arrived on the scene, and shipbuilding thrived in Oregon City itself and just upriver in Canemah, now a neighborhood of the city. In 1889, the Willamette Falls E ectric Company transmitted the first electric power sent long-distance over power lines, from the falls to Portland.


The falls were the site of paper mills on both sides of the river — and B ue Heron Paper Company was a major employer in Oregon City, at the south end of Main Street, until its closure in 2011 expanded the redevelopment potential of the city.

The town's unique geography — split between a series of terraces rising from the river — contributes to another prominent local feature: Oregon City boasts a municipallyowned elevator, unique in the hemisphere. The elevator rises up the bluff and provides a view of the falls, mill, historic downtown and two bridges spanning the Willamette.

Wat 's new:

One big question facing Oregon City for 2014: Who will be its mayor starting in 2015?

Mayor Doug Neeley has to take at least two years off from public office due to term limits. He has several big initiatives he hopes to wrap up before his term expires at the end 2014. These include a new police station, a renovated/expanded library and development in the downtown urban-renewal area.

Neeley began remarks at this year's State of the City Address with a moment of silence for fallen OCPD Reserve Officer Rob Libke, who was shot by a suicidal arsonist in November. A round of applause followed for Libke's wife, who just gave birth to their daughter in February.

A ballot measure will appear on the May ballot to authorize Oregon City to sell the bonds to expand and renovate its Carnegie Library, built to serve 5,000 people and now serving a population of 54,000.


Although voters prevented the water-rate rollback last year, the public-works department has identified facility needs that will threaten the quality of drinking water if voters don't allow more than 3 percent per-year rate increases. City commissioners also have made it a goal to address more than \$ million in deferred maintenance for parks. By 2022, Oregon City is required to build a seismically sound police station and is working with the school district on a proposed location.

E forts are underway to increase the city's population, tax base and number of opportunities for economic development. An approximately \$0 million Clackamette Cove project is expected soon to begin construction of garden apartments after years of languishing in the declining condo market. After the recent passage of smaller annexations, Neeley is looking forward to more annexations passing to allow the development of the B avercreek plan.
