The handles are then painted by hand and finished with boiled linseed oil. Buy one at Lizard Lounge, 1323 N.W. Irving St., in Portland, for \$150.

Powell's has the first two seasons of "Portlandia" as well as the new "Portlandia: A Guide for Visitors." On sale for \$11.89, the guidebook is reportedly "printed on 130 percent recycled paper in a peanut-free, smokefree plant by local workers in a friendly but fair environment, free of sudden noises and

unnatural light."

Also at Powell's is the recently released cookbook from Sugar Cube, the pink Portland food cart known for irresistible sweets. The 50 recipes are accompanied by enticing photos, sassy headnotes and illustrations. It's \$24.95.

Other books to consider

■ "Ricochet River," by Robin Cody, a novel of rivers and Indian lore. The Oregon Cultural Heritage Commission recognized the book as one of the 100 essential Oregon books in 2005. "Voyage of a Summer Sun" is the story of Cody's 82-day solo canoe trip down the Columbia River from its source in Canada to Astoria. With "Voyage," Cody won the 1995 Oregon Book Award for creative nonfiction. His most recent book, "Another Way the River Has," is a collection of short, true stories.

■ "The Necessary Grace to Fall," a collection of short stories by Gina Ochsner. She has been awarded a John L. Simon Guggenheim grant and a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. She is the author of the short story collection that received the Flannery O'Connor Award for short fiction, and the story collection "People I Wanted to Be." Both books received the Oregon Book Award.

Her newest novel, "The Russian Dreambook of Colour and Flight," has been called "heartbreaking and funny and deeply moving"

"Murder in the Steens" is the ninth book in Ron Lovell's series of mysteries. The books feature Thomas Martindale, a college journalism professor and amateur sleuth.

■ "Heartstone," by Phillip Margolin. Margolin grew up in New York state and graduated from New York University School of Law. His first job after law school was a clerkship with Herbert M. Schwab, chief judge, Oregon Court of Appeals. From 1972 until 1996, he was in private practice in

Portland, specializing in criminal defense at the trial and appellate levels. "Heartstone," which was his first novel, was nominated for an Edgar for best original paperback mystery of 1978. His second novel, "The Last Innocent Man," was made into an HBO movie. Since 1996, Margolin has been writing full time, and all of his novels have been New York Times best-sellers. His latest novel, "Capitol Murder," was published in April.

"Massacred for Gold: The Chinese in Hells Canyon," by R. Greg Nokes. After a 43-year career with the Associated Press and The Oregonian, Nokes began a second career as a writer and lecturer on the experience of immigrant Chinese in the Pacific Northwest. His book is the first authoritative account of the long-forgotten 1887 massacre of as many as 34 Chinese gold miners in Oregon's Hells Canyon. Nokes now is working on a book dealing with the treatment of African-Americans in the Pacific Northwest in the early days of the region's settlement. He lives with his wife, Candace, in West Linn.

■ "Mink River," by Brian Doyle. This book is considered by many as a must-read for all Oregonians.

Grab a bite

hether you're preparing to set out for a day of holiday shopping, or ready to relax and let someone else do the cooking, tasty food always makes the day better. This winter gather with family and friends and celebrate the holidays by eating out. Try something new.

Portland and its surrounding communities host a gamut of primo eating spots. The level of cooking and mixology is outstanding, and the range of choices, almost endless. Naturally, the holidays are a busy time and the crafters behind the ingredients create one recipe after another so we all can momentarily sit down and enjoy being served.

Here's a few places to whet your whistle and grab a bite. Bring your appetite.

Iconic Peruvian flair — Andina Restau-

rant, 1314 N.W. Glisan St., Portland (503-228-9535). Stop by Andina for contemporary novo Peruvian cuisine. The traditional dishes are nurtured by chefs who add modern touches and prepare them with sophistication.

Many people come in for the tapas served in small, medium and large plates starting at

\$10.50. The rich fusion of tastes and aromas are created to complement the Pacific Northwest. The freshest, most authentic ingredients available are used. Here's just one example from the current menu of traditional main courses: Arroz con Pato, a gourmet version of an iconic Peruvian dish with duck served two ways: crispy duck confit and duck breast panseared to order. The poultry is paired with cilantro-infused rice, a savory-sweet passion-fruit sauce and baby carrots. The food and ambience is designed to give guests a glimpse

of Peru and Latin America in a comfortable setting of bright colors, earth tones and Incan architecture. Enjoy daily live music by a host of Peruvian artisans.

Lunch is now served — Bugatti's Ristoran-

te, 18740 Willamette Drive, West Linn, (503-636-9555). There are four Bugatti's restaurants in the area (West Linn, Tanasbourne, Beaverton and Oregon City) but only one original Italian dinner house in West Linn's Robinwood neighborhood.

New corporate executive chef Rodney Duncan plans on leaving all the great fan favorites on the menu including the extensive selection of goodies and an ambitious assortment of cocktails and Italian wines. "Customers will continue to find traditional Italian recipes that are homemade and consistent, and great value dishes," he says, referring to the ravioli dish of the week.

One of the big changes in West Linn: For the first time, lunch is being served. From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., an afternoon menu is being offered. Look forward to sandwiches, such as turkey with dried tomatoes and pulled braised lamb with feta and roasted garlic aioli, and a luncheon spin on some serious dinner entrees. Stop by for a drink and experience happy hour every day from 4:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. If you like, choose a seat, year-round, on the bright, warm patio. To cap off a meal, try one of Maria Koenig's housemade desserts.

Brunch and better — Bar Carlo, 6433 S.E. Foster Road, Portland (503-771-1664). Come experience food and drinks in a comfortable, laid-back atmosphere. Open six years this February, the two-room eatery offers tasty specials and delectable cocktails. Brunch is served until 3 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays. All dishes are made from scratch, including the salsas and chorizo, a spicy cured Spanish sausage. (The owners take particular care in ordering local, natural meats.) The great use of seasonal ingredients and meaty flavors makes this restaurant a pleasant surprise. Try the savory crepes, anything made with

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carnitas (slow-braised pork), corned beef hash, or the vegetarian selections. And listen carefully to the daily specials — you'll be tempted by the mouthwatering combinations. Wash it down with a watermelon margarita or bloody mary. Closed Tuesdays.

Fresh Vietnamese — Mai Asia Restaurant, 8489 S.W. Warm Springs St., Tualatin (503-691-9304). This small, family-run operation offers a variety of dishes including grilled pork and shrimp, sesame beef, peanut chicken satay, red coconut curry, lemongrass marinated beef fillet, and gluten-free entrees. The "Wok Yourself," or make-your-own combination, can inspire a number of Asian fusion dishes such as red curry with basil, ginger and vegetables for \$5.95 (or add shrimp for \$8.50). Many guests stop by for the flavorful slow simmered soups. The beef brisket pho (soup) has tasty hints of anise and cinnamon and is served with a generous portion of tangy sweet basil and sprouts. The food is real fresh, simple and reasonably priced. Pull up a chair at one of 10 modest tables. Call ahead for a quick to-go order. Closed Sundays.

Happy hour hot spot — McCormick's Fish House & Bar, 9945 S.W. Beaverton-Hillsdale Highway, Beaverton (503-643-1322). The menu, printed daily, reflects seafood, pastas, aged steaks, gourmet salads and house-made desserts such as chocolate espresso cake. Local ranches, farms and wineries supply some of the ingredients for the regionally inspired dishes.

Happy hour here is a neighborhood favorite with a bar that features hand-crafted cocktails (including \$6 margaritas) using freshsqueezed juices, \$3.50 draft beer, \$4 well drinks, \$5 glasses of wine and \$7 martinis. The \$2.95 to \$5.95 food menu includes a fullsize cheeseburger and fries, calamari, spinach dip, Baja fish tacos and shrimp skewers. Gath every day from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. to close, and 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday. The restaurant serves lunch and dinner daily with the exception of no lunch on Sundays.

It's about the love — Mother's Bistro & Bar, 212 S.W. Stark St., Portland (503-464-1122). Lisa Schroeder, owner and chef at Mother's, offers American home-style, slow-

cooked food prepared with love. Her recipes are inspired by moms and resemble the dishes lovingly cooked by mothers for their families. Pot roast, meatloaf, the pasta of the day, Caesar salad, vegan stir-fry, sautéed seasonal vegetables and creme brulée are some of the menu favorites. Each month a recommended mother's, from anywhere around the world, specialty recipes are featured. This month's "Mom of the Month" is Therese Dieringer from Hungary. Celebrating family, Italian style — Tucci Italian Restaurant, 220 S.W. A Ave., Lake Oswego (503-697-3383). Unwind in the dining atmosphere that embodies the importance of spending time with family and friends. Celebrating its 10th-year anniversary, from the kitchen comes the flavors of Italian-style foods made with fresh Northwest ingredi-

Entrees are complemented by a selection of artisanal Italian wines. 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

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Gift of green

re you trying to find last-minute gifts that are fresh and thoughtful but not too costly? Your dilemma may be solved by making unique plant gifts like an oversize coffee mug filled with sedum succulents for coffee lovers or a miniature beach vacation scene inside a glass terrarium to brighten a winter afternoon.

Materials and advice for the following plant gifts are available at **The Gardener's Choice** on Highway 99 in Tigard, except for the **hanging glass terrarium ornament**, which is available at **New Season's Market**, Progress Ridge in Beaverton as well as other New Season's locations.

Mini-terracotta pot with paperwhite narcissus, \$2 — Plant a narcissus bulb in a bit of potting soil inside a tiny terracotta pot. Place pot over a saucer. If you have a pot without a drainage hole, use pebbles instead of soil. Tie a ribbon around the pot and add a holiday gift card.

Antiqued porcelain teacup with paperwhite narcissus, \$6 — Antiqued teacup crackle-paint ed with a frog, butterfly, or dragonflies gives this gift personality. Add smooth pebbles and a

single paperwhite narcissus bulb. A drain hole is not needed if the narcissus is planted in gravel. Make sure gravel only coves about one-half of the bulb. The narcissus will bloom in four to six weeks from planting.

Decorative holiday arrangement in a pot, \$25

— Start with a red pottery container and then add florist foam as a base. Purchase, or snip from your garden, evergreen stems and arrange upright by "planting" in the foam. Add pine cones or ornamental balls with wire or bows. Arrangement is suitable for inside or outside and will last weeks with watering.

Hanging Glass Terrarium Ornament, \$13 — Green thumb experts at New Seasons at Progress Ridge in Beaverton offer a class to teach how to assemble a small pear-shaped terrarium with sedums and sand for \$13, all materials included. If you miss the class, the experts are available to advise you.

Hanging conical basket with cut arrange-

ment, \$20-40 — Rustic weave "ice cream cone" base includes handle-hook and a plastic liner. Insert soaked florist foam in bottom of basket. Select cuttings of red twig dogwood, juniper, holly, and arrange in foam. Attach pinecones,

ornamental balls, and birds with wires.

Evergreen holiday wreath, \$10-30 — Start with a 16-inch wire wreath form. Add evergreen cuttings from your garden or the local garden shop. Combine two or three stems into a bundle and insert into an opening in the wire grid. Fill each wire grid with bundles, overlapping bundles to add fullness. Stephanie of The Gardener's Choice, Tigard, suggests using juniper, rosehips, camellia, nandina, and holly stems. Add pinecones and a ribbon.

Day at the beach in a fish bowl terrarium,

\$16-60 — For a whimsical gift, make a fish bowl terrarium a miniature vacation location. Just add sand and dollhouse beach furniture. Multiple sizes of terrariums and assorted dollhouse furniture are available at The Gardener's Choice.

Living sedum wreath, \$30-100 — The living sedum wreath will be a cherished gift that may take a few hours to assemble. Start with a 14-inch living wreath wire form. Line the bottom of the form with sphagnum moss and add potting soil. Make small planting holes in the soil with a screwdriver, and insert the root balls of small sedum plants into the holes. Use a variety of sedum colors and textures distributed evenly about the wreath. Cover all exposed dirt with sphagnum moss. Soak bottom of wreath in a garbage can lid filled with water for about half an hour. Let the wreath lie flat for a week before hanging up. Hardy succulent wreaths are suited for either indoors or outdoors.



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
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
